We have worked hard and worked together. We have been working in the right direction with a clear vision & mission of the institution. The importance of building an educational institute is not less than the importance of building a nation. Curricular Aspects

Sharda Mahavidyalaya Arts and Science, Parbhani offers 4 undergraduate and 2 postgraduate programs. The college has well planned teaching, learning and evaluation process. College displays the academic calendar at the commencement of the academic year. College has effective curriculum delivery system of which operational parameters are well-planned academic calendar, schedule of work, time table, formal /informal continuous evaluation and monitoring the overall teaching learning process. The Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) system is followed as per the norms and guide lines of the S.R.T.M. University. It is conducted as per the academic calendar of the college. The teachers of the college were elected/selected on BOS of the parent university and actively participated in framing, restructuring the curricula and various examination work allotted by university. The principal of the college was ex In-charge DEAN of science faculty, he was involved indirectly for framing the curriculum. Faculty members of the College actively participate and give their inputs in workshops on restructuring of syllabi organized by the University in various colleges. One workshop was organized in college during last five years. In the last five years self financing courses M. A. Urdu and M. A. Psychology newly introduced keeping in view the changing needs of the society. All programs of college adopted CBSC. The curriculum of the number of courses of the programme enrich with professional ethics, gender, human values and environment. Teachers of the college have given experimental learning of the courses to the students through project work/field work. College has collected the feedback on curriculum from different stake holders. It was also used to identify the applicability of programs as well as to achieve the goals.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The college has well planned teaching, learning and evaluation process. In the last five years 4762 students have studied in the College. Average enrolment percentage in relation to the sanctioned strength is 55.95. The number of students admitted from reserved categories is 1873. Average enrolment percentage of students admitted from the reserved category in relation to the seats earmarked for reservation category is 42.52. The college have a strategy for advanced learners and slow learners. The average students to teachers ratio is 34.41:1. Student centric innovative and creative teaching methods are used for enhancing learning experiences of students. The teachers make use of ICT tools and resources in their teaching. The mentor system is also implemented for academic and stress related issues. Average percentage of full time teachers against sanctioned posts during the last five years is 84.9. Average percentage of full time teachers with Ph.D. during the last five years is 72.4. Average teaching experience of full time teacher in the same institution is 17.79. Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) system is followed as per the norms and guide lines of the S.R.T.M. University. Mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient. Program outcomes and course outcomes for all the programs offered by the institution are stated and displayed on the College website. It has been evaluated by the college. Total number of students appear for final exam was 984, average pass percentage of final year students is 60.04 during the assessment year. One of the students of MA psychology got the Merit First Prize in university examination. The college gives prizes for meritorious students at the annual prize distribution program which motivates and inspires students for their endeavors in academic growth.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college encourages teachers to undertake research work and present research findings in the periodicals and journals. About 44.82 % of the teachers are recognized as research guide at present and guiding to the Ph.D students. 7 research projects funded by UGC and SRTMU Nanded during last five years. In the institution 29 full time teachers working in the institution and in addition to that teachers on clock hours basis is also working to compensate the workload. College teachers has published 137 research papers in various reputed and UGC listed journals. 08 books, 20 chapters in edited books published by teachers during the last five years. 90 research papers published in national/international conferences proceedings. 20.95 % departments having research projects funded by UGC and SRTMU Nanded. Institute has not having any incubation center but efforts have taken for activities for creation and transfer of knowledge. Research activities of teachers, participation of students in Avishkar research festival and student's participation in "Sarsavat" college annual magazine has shown remarkable contribution for creation and transfer of knowledge. 6 teachers recognized as a research guide during last five years. 16 research students registered under college research guide for Ph.D. during the last five years. The NSS department of college organizes extension activities in and around Parbhani city. NSS and other departments were conducted 36 extension activities in association with NGO's and other departments. The average percentage of students for participation in extension activities is 4.91 which were conducted in association with GO's & NGO's like Swachha Bharat, Aids awareness, gender issue etc. 07 awards and recognitions received for extension activities by teachers during last five years. A department of chemistry has established linkages with other research institute for research purposes through which they got facilities related with their research. We are thinking about to establish MOU with other agencies or colleges.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The sharda Mahavidyalaya Art's & Science, Parbhani located in the urban area .The college campus is spread over an area of 0.9846 acre. At present, the college has 27 classrooms, 09 laboratories, 01 computer labs, 07 ICT based classrooms including smart classroom(seminar halls). College buildings including have the administrative building and the library. Apart from it, college also has a Canteen, indoor hall and conference hall within the campus and college inadequate play ground so that college uses the play ground of the other institution and government sector located outside the college campus on request basis. The college also utilizes the available infrastructural facilities of brother institution of society whenever they required. 25 % of classrooms and a seminar hall with ICT enabled facilities available in college. 3.36 % of expenditure excluding salary incurred for infrastructure augmentation. The college library has nearly 12444 books. In addition, it has rare books, manuscripts and special collections. The college library has also LIBMAN library management software, e-resources such as e-journals and databases. A special reading room of library is under construction and it likely to be completed shortly. A special reading room of library is under construction. Total expenditure for purchase of books/e-books and journals/e-journals during the last five years is 418000/-. Student-computer ratio for current year is 1 : 26.97. Internet bandwidth used is 10 mbps for the common leased line used by the College. Wi Fi facilities is also available. Expenditure incurred on maintenance of physical facilities and academic support facilities during the last five years is 5024000/-. College properly maintain and utilizes all the facilities made available in campus.

Student Support and Progression

The college is mainly catering to the needs of the students and maintained healthy environment and supportive

resources for student progression and well being. 37.2 % students received various scholarships provided by the government. The college has competitive examination cell and career counseling cell through that some of the activities were organized to create capacity building in the students. The competitive examination cell display advertisements and guide to the students who approach to the committee members. Career Counseling & Placement cell has conducted placement camp. 0.9 % students have benefited from guidance for competitive examinations and career counseling & Placement cell offered by the institution during the last five years. 11 students placed through placement camp. College has student redressal committee, prevention of sexual harassment committee and anti-ragging committee which has done works properly for redressal of students grievances. Percentage of student progression to higher education is 70.85 % during last five years. 21 students qualified in state and national level examinations during the last five years. 08 of our students have won awards/medals for outstanding performance in sports & cultural activities at university, state & national level during the last five years. The college has Student Council. Student representatives are present on some of the college committees such as CDC, IQAC, College Annual Magazine Committee etc. 145 students have been participated in sports and cultural events/competitions organized in the College and other institution during last five years. The college has registered alumni association. It has contribution in support services for college development. It regularly provide feedback to the college about its functioning and makes suggestions for its improvement.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Sharda Nahavidyalaya Art's & Science, Parbhani is affiliated to S.R.T.M.U., Nanded. The college follows the norms of the University, State Government and Policies adopted by Model English Education Society's. The college administration committed with the vision and mission which has been stated by the institution. College Development Committee gives advice to the college authorities for the smooth functioning of the college. Principal, coordinators of the cell and chairman's of committees look after the internal coordination and smooth functioning of the administration. The college administration follows the perspective plan for college development. The college has separate anti ragging committee, purchase committee, grievance Redressal committee etc, which works according to the guidelines framed. The college has e-governance system in administration, student admissions and examinations. The college has various welfare schemes for employees e.g. loans are sanctioned to the permanent employees by model college employee's credit co-operative society. Medical reimbursement, home loan, loans against General Provident Fund and other welfare facilities provided to staffs. The college encourages the faculty to participate in Refresher, Orientation, and Faculty Development Programs. During last five years 57 such programmes completed by the faculty members. Financial supports are granted to the teaching and non-teaching staffs for attending workshops, seminars and conferences. College administration assesses the performance of teaching staffs by evaluating their API. There is transparency in the accounts and utilization of funds. The accounts are audited regularly. IQAC undertakes quality sustenance and quality enhancement measures for the development of quality culture of academic and administrative activities.

The college has conducted gender equity promotion programs in addition to academic and extension activities through NSS and other departments. The college has provided the facilities such as safety and security, counseling and common room to the girl students. College has no any remarkable contribution for alternate sources of energy, energy conservation and waste management system. College has rain water harvesting system. Eco-friendly practices are adopted by the college such as encouraging students and staff by using bicycles and ensuring plastic free campus. College has maintained campus greenery by plantation on every

year. The college has ramps for easy access to classroom for disabled students. The college has taken the efforts for providing an inclusive environment during the last five years. College has also conducted the various activities for promotion of universal and national values as well as for observance of fundamental duties during the last five years. College has prescribed code of conduct for students, teachers and non teaching staff. It is displayed over the website of the college. Discipline committee monitors the adherence of code of conduct by students. Principal of the college gives the information about the code of conduct of students, teaching and non teaching staffs in the meeting and programmes. College has conducted the activities for celebration of national/international commemorative days, events and festivals during the last five years. 1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

The college affiliated to Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University , Nanded. Our college provides Graduate and post-graduate level courses. The curriculum of graduate and post graduate courses are designed by respective board of studies of SRTM University Nanded. In the design of curriculum our college faculty members have actively participated. Same curriculum is delivered through a well planned and documented process. At the beginning of the academic year the IQAC prepares and discusses action plan of the academic year to all the faculty members.

The head of the concerned departments organises meeting at the start of academic year. In the meeting discussions on various topics related to effective curriculum such as syllabus delivery, supporting syllabus , workload distribution, teaching plan and time-table (department and individual) were made fruitful.

All faculty members prepare their teaching plan for effective implementation of the curriculum. The syllabi are unitized according to the teaching schedule. Time-table committee prepare time-table of the college. The HOD of the department distributes time-table among the faculties of the department. All the faculty members regularly maintain their academic dairy which has the record of the daily teaching with all the details. The dairy is verified and signed by the Principal.

The departments of Science and Social science organise short excursion to various places to deliver practical knowledge of the curriculum.

Project work is assigned to final year students of all programmes, which is the part of curriculum and partial fulfillment of their studies. Our college faculty members actively participate in workshop on curriculum by other institutions for better understanding of revised curriculum.

The college takes feedback on curriculum from the students. The college upgrades infrastructural facilities. Lecture method of teaching is supplemented with other methods. In these methods there is greater involvement of teachers and students in the teaching learning process. 2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

Sharda Mahavidyalaya, Arts & Science, Parbhani has students from diverse backgrounds--urban-rural, English-Marathi-Urdu mediums, and State-CBSE boards. . As the students taking admission in the College are from diverse backgrounds their competence-levels also vary. Language proficiency, competence, familiarity with techniques and technology, subject knowledge and the extent of motivation are a few of the determining factors revealing advanced and slow learners. The learner-levels are assessed at varying stages of the teaching-learning process. At the entry stage, the overall percentage of marks obtained at the qualifying examination is an indicator. Students' language proficiency, regularity, attentiveness, participation in class activities, etc. are other indicators. Learners are also assessed on the basis of their social skills and initiative in departmental activities. Students' performances in the various internal and external evaluations provide another way of determining learner-levels. Based on these various indicators, the varying educational needs of the advanced and slow learners are observed. Special Programmes: The College offers equal opportunities to all learners. Moreover, some extra efforts are taken to cater to the special needs of advanced and slow learners. Advanced learners are encouraged to participate in various programmes, seminars, competitions, research project competitions are organized in the college or by other institutions. Students of every department are encouraged to organize exhibitions, cultural and curricular activities. They are given assistance to attend seminars and conferences. Advanced learners are also encouraged to access additional study materials from digital resources apart from the special books available in library. Slow learners are encouraged to benefit from 'Remedial Coaching' and 'Subject-related guidance'. Class notes, text and reference books for additional reading, downloaded video clips on the subject matter, PPTs and freely available e-books are made available to the students to refer to. In relevant cases bi-lingual teaching is used in order to assist the slow learners. Teachers frequently counsel the slow learners. A lot of personal-level interaction between students and teachers motivates both the advanced and slow learners. PG students are mentored by their teachers in the course of the Continuous Internal Evaluation system. Thus, during the tests, presentations and assignments students get to receive personal attention and guidance. The library has a reading section which is open the whole day for students to study in. There is a separate section in the library for the girl students. During examinations the reading room is kept open for a longer duration. Teachers too his/her own issue books to their students. Students are also encouraged to access resources available on the internet.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

Experiential Learning: From long experience, teachers at Sharda Mahavidyalaya have understood that experiential learning, participatory learning, innovative teaching and problem solving method are the essential components of the teaching-learning process. Experiential learning skills include field trips and projects. The entire practical that the science and some social sciences departments conduct have a bearing on experiential learning. Field trips are organized by science departments like Zoology, Botany, and Microbiology to study natural science phenomena and they learn from observation. Informal ways of experiential teaching includes the use of plants found on the campus. The Arts/Social Sciences departments like History and Psychology also organize study tours and field visits. ICT-enabled teaching is practiced by most of the teachers. The teachers of humanities use film shows in their classrooms. Participatory Learning :The various participatory activities that the college has introduced over the years include group discussions, debates, quiz, writing assignments, seminars, project writing, demonstrations, exhibitions, writing articles, students' seminars, case studies, community surveys, consultation with specialists, etc. Project writing and wall paper publication are activities that various departments have practiced over the years. Under the CBCS, the PG students have to do a series of assignments and class presentations where the active participation of each learner is a must Problem Solving: The college has hosted the Zonal level Avishkar competition. The projects that the students of Science, Commerce and Social Sciences do as part of curricular work are also indicative of the importance that the college gives to problem solving. Students are allowed to give seminars based on their syllabus .In undergraduate classes; the textbooks contain tasks which the students have to solve. They also contain questions for critical thinking which the students try to answer with the teacher's assistance.

Teachers uses I.C.T. as well as e-learning resources, which has shown the effective result in teaching and learning process of college. In these methods there is greater involvement of teachers and students in the teaching learning process. Teachers use various e-learning resources for LMS in all programmes offered in college.

College has well equipped smart class room, LCD projector with screen and dept of mathematics, computer language lab having internet facility through LAN. The college has Wi-Fi unit for the teachers and students inside the campus. Teachers are taking the benefit of these to make their lecture more meaningful and interesting.

The institute encourages to teachers to attend training programmes related to ICT use in teaching and learning process. College have 29 fulltime permanent teachers for both the programme B.A. and B.Sc. among 29 near about 26 faculty members are using e-learning resources during their lectures from different e-domain. Other remaining faculty members they also use e-learning resources but not in lectures except Principal & Librarian of the college. All the faculty members go through with different search engine for development of e-content of courses for the lecturers. In ICT enabled teaching teachers uses PPT, videos, Youtube.

Percentage of teachers using e-learning are 89.65 %. These ICT facility are also provided to students for delivering the subject seminars and project work. Teachers provides the PPT, e-books and soft copies of study material to students for study. College library has Inlibnet facility, educational CD's & DVD's for the use of teachers and students.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Response:

The internal assessment is carried out at the college. As per the examination pattern prescribed by the affiliating university, i.e., SRTMU, all the departments conduct continuous internal evaluation of every course in each semester. This system of evaluation includes a variety of test-types such as unit test, assignments, projects, seminars etc. Its pattern is different for different courses. Teachers guide the students about the pattern of the internal examinations well in advance. The schedule of these internal examinations is same for the entire departments and is spreader out across the semester are conducted. The examination notices are displayed well in advance and sufficient time is given to the students for preparation. The complete guidelines and rules regarding examinations are provided in the college prospectus. The continuous internal evaluation conducted by the departments provides an excellent opportunity to the students to not only showcase their learning but also to develop their skills such as academic writing, public speaking and public defense. It also enhances their participation in classroom activities and improves the overall teaching-learning process. After the internal evaluation, students' performance is discussed with the students and necessary suggestions are given for further improvement. For undergraduate students, internal assessment comprises term end examinations and practical or assignments. Practical are conducted regularly and according to a well-planned and properly communicated schedule. All prescribed practical are conducted and the students are given sufficient training in carrying them out. Thus, students are prepared to perform well in the practical examinations. Term-end examinations are held at the end of the first term and the second term. Term-wise syllabus as prescribed by the affiliating university, SRTMU, is completed in each term. The internal examinations are conducted following the same model as the final examinations.

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal/external examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

The grievances of the students related to examinations are addressed at two levels—college and university—depending upon the nature of the grievances. Grievances related to the internal assessment are handled by the examination section of the college whereas grievances related to the external assessment are forwarded to the university. In case of any grievance, the college collects the applications and forwards it to the authorities concerned. The facility for rechecking and re-evaluation of answer sheets is available for the students. Students are free to approach teachers and head of departments to resolve their queries related to the marks obtained in internal assessment, if any. If the student concerned is not satisfied by the procedure mentioned above, they may meet the Principal. Students with any grievance regarding evaluation are given clarifications,. Thus grievance redressal with reference to examinations is transparent. Examination related grievances are received by the authorities concerned of the college in a time-bound manner. All complaints are attended with utmost clarity and resolved in a short time. As for the grievances related to university examinations, the time taken depends on the policies of the SRTMU. The grievance

redressal mechanism pertaining to examinations is efficient as all complaints are entertained without exception, resolved within a reasonable amount of time, is transparent as even photocopies of the answer sheets are furnished.

continuously based on their regularity, their receptiveness, participation in class discussions, their answers to questions asked by the teacher and the overall quality of their conduct. Their performance in the internal examinations provides the initial indication of their learning outcome. Teachers provide critical inputs to the students on the basis of this performance. Thus they are helped to improve their performance in the external examinations.

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1 Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the last five years.

Response:

The college conducts different extension activities in the neighborhood community in terms of impact and sensitizing students to social issues and holistic development. The institution plans and organizes all the extension activities through the NSS unit of the college. The NSS unit of the college organizes various extension activities. The students participate in socially useful activities like plantation, cleanliness awareness, environment awareness, snake awareness, AIDS awareness, sadbhavana rally etc.

At the commencement of the academic year, Principal and NSS Programme Officer prepare a plan and inform to the students in detail about the various NSS activities. The NSS unit adopts a nearby village for three years and different outreach programmes are organized there. The volunteers carry out a cleanliness drive and stay there for a week in the camp taking up different works like cleaning of drainage and roads. Academic and Support Facilities: The college has made available modern teaching aids like LCD projectors. Two Xerox machines, 12 CCTV cameras, two public address systems, software required for academics are made available. The HOD's meet the Principal in every month and discusses issues like the academic calendar, attendance, teaching learning process and discipline, which are communicated to the other members of the staff through departmental meetings. The teachers follow the instructions given by the University for the Overall Development of the institutes. The college has its own college development council (CDC) wherein the management representative, IQAC coordinator and the senior most staff members are included. In its meeting the committee analyses the feedback of teachers, students on curriculum. The Principal is the head of the institutions. He perform the following functions a such as planning of future, developing all resources for execution and monitoring the entire process etc. the institutions prepare the prospective plan of the institution to which the society and the institution gets benefits.

Organization of NSS camp through the NSS scheme, there is decentralized system in our college. In this scheme Coordinator of NSS has to make an application towards the principal for organization of NSS camp in village. The principal gives permission for organization of camp. The College committee of NSS

prepares the action plan of the organization of camp. It is submitted towards Principal for approval. As per approval NSS committee display the notice to participating student. As per the action plan different guests are invited for various activities. During the camp documentary evidences will be collected. 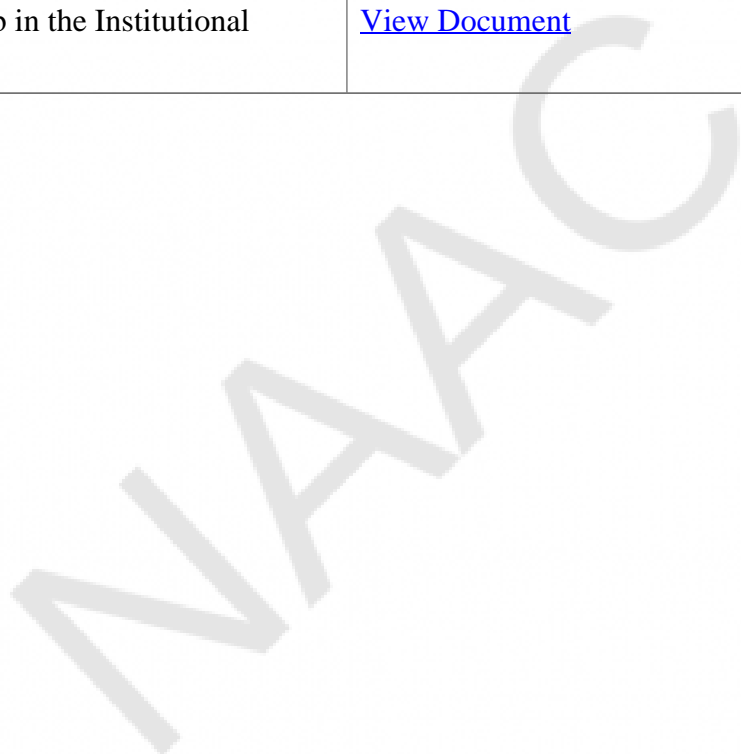
Response:
